
Neely Cemetery

This cemetery is located in $E\frac{1}{2}$ NW $\frac{1}{4}$ T40 R4 Sec 30, Lat 38° 10' 27" N, Lon 90° 37' 21" W. Go west on "Y" highway from De Soto to the intersection of Tin House Road; make a left "south" onto a gravel road directly across from Tin House. Continue down the gravel for about $\frac{1}{2}$ mile cemetery on right "west" side of road.

I visited this cemetery 10 May 1999. It is a field about 1 acre in size along the gravel lane. This tract was owned in 1876 by R. L. Blackmer who had 120 acres and a building at this site and was owned in 1898 by Fritz Glass who had 80 acres and a building on this site.

According to a Post Dispatch newspaper article dated Thursday, 6 May 1999 By Benjamin



Israel, Ralph Krodinger states the property was deeded to the county by the Neely family before his first term of office in 1971. Krodinger said the Neely family was from St. Louis. "They had buried some of their ancestors out there, but they had no use for it so they gave it to us."

As of this time I do not know where Jefferson County buried before 1982, however as I get time I am going to research this and do another report of the results.

These are drawings I made from a map the county highway department had and the

names of the persons buried there I obtained from the County Commission Office located in the Court House Annex at Hillsboro. Also is included the information from the County burials in Hillsboro Cemetery.


In the other category (Lemme) & (Mahn) denotes the funeral parlor that buried this person.

JARRETT, THOMAS M.

Born Friday, 5 September 1890


Died Sunday, 11 June 1961

Aged 70y 9m 6d

Thomas' parents were Richard & Mary Ann (Moden) Jarrett. The source of this information was the Dietrich Funeral Home Records.

New information from Dave Long. Dave tells that the Jarretts were black people. They were neighbors of his family who lived up the road. Mrs. Jarrett was a light-skinned woman who worked in St. Louis and drove back and forth each day. His mother knew her well. Mr. Jarrett was much darker skinned and Dave does not recall him working anywhere except on the farm. At that time a Mr. Christopher (also a black man) owned the farm. Dave does not remember that they had many visitors.

- * It appears from records that more than one person is buried in this graves.
- ** If memory serves me correct this was a body found in the Mississippi River.
- *** Map shows burial date of September 7.

Many of these people simply have outlived all of their relatives. There was no one left living to bury them. Some, their family may have just simply have not wanted to forgo the expense of a burial. Some as in the case of Carol Mills, when the family learned that a relative was gone, reclaimed the body to give it a proper burial.

There are undoubtedly many more persons who were buried by the County that we have no record of. I found this one listed in Della Lang's Book *Deaths from Jefferson county Newspapers*, 1866-1920 Book II, compiled from the Leader and Democrat newspapers.

Site unknown Leutzinger, Alex "died at the county farm, buried in Hillsboro Cemetery." (February 11, 1904)

The county buries these persons as cheaply as possible, using highway department personnel and equipment to dig the grave, a wooden stake to mark the grave, a cardboard box as a casket, and no one to say a prayer for them.



The greatness of our society is measured by how we take care of those in need. It is my hope that Jefferson County, some organization, or persons, erect a monument for these people, lest they be forgotten.
